Good evening and welcome!

Welcome! Thank you for joining us this evening.

With leaves turning golden, nights drawing in, and fires being lit, autumn is the perfect time to reflect ... and what better way to do so than through the gift of music! Welcome to TrueNorth's Fall Concert, **Down a Country Lane**. It is our hope this evening our music will allow for a pause, a time of reflection and inspiration.

We'd like to thank Bay United Methodist Church as we are not only performing here this evening, but Bay United Methodist opens their doors for us to rehearse each Tuesday and Thursday evening throughout the year ... truly a gift.

Tonight, you will hear poetry set to music.

Stéphane Mallarmé's *L'après-midi d'un faune* poetry inspired Claude DeBussy to write *An Afternoon of a Faun*. One of Debussy's most famous works and considered a turning point in the history of Western art music, as well as a masterpiece of Impressionist composition. Tonight's performance features Susan Richardson as our flute soloist.

Jean Sibelius' *Finlandia* is a tone poem, a covert protest against increasing censorship from the Russian Empire written in 1899.

Down a Country Lane, a quiet, peaceful work composed by Aaron Copland. Copland enjoyed the challenge of composing for young performers. In 1962, *Life Magazine* featured this piece, commissioned by *Life*, in hopes of making quality music available to the common pianist and student. Down a Country Lane was orchestrated in 1965.

Frostiana was commissioned in 1958 for the 200th anniversary of Amherst, Massachusetts Bicentennial. Seven of Robert Frost's poems that celebrated the countryside and people of New England as they were at the time of the commission were used by composer Randall Thompson. All of the poems, except for "**Choose Something Like a Star**", are from one book of Frost's poems, **You Come Too.**

Membership in both the Chorale and Chamber Orchestra are open to all high school students and above. The Chorale and Chamber Orchestra rehearses at Bay United Methodist Church, 29931 Lake Road in Bay Village. The Chorale rehearses on Tuesday evenings, 7:00-9:00 p.m. The Chamber Orchestra rehearses on Thursday evenings, 7:30-9:30 p.m.

Mr. Fortney received his Bachelor of Music and Master of Arts Degrees from Bowling Green State University.


